With its magnificent mountains, captivating seascapes and deep forests, this unique part of Scotland has enjoyed a starring role in hundreds of movies and TV productions over the years, from dramas to thrillers and romantic comedies, with everything in between!

With 'set-jetting' a growing trend and more and more film fans visiting the locations of their favourite movies, where better to explore a destination's relationship with the big screen than the Scottish Highlands?

This map provides a selection of the wide range of films that feature the north of Scotland and the Isle of Skye. There are many more to discover, but as an introduction, let this map take you into the world of cinematic Scotland and re-live your favourite movie

The Eagle (2011)

Achiltibuie. The village of the Seal people was constructed a few miles north at Fox Point. Loch Maree. Appearing in the film Loch Maree is

considered one of the most beautiful in Scotland. Bealach na Ba. Marcus and Esca look out across the landscape before moving on to reclaim the lost army



Rannoch Moor. Site of the battle witnessed by

Braveheart (1995)

Loch Leven. Wallace is seen running across the ten peaks of the Mamores above the loch.

Glen Nevis. Used in early scenes in the film, including the return home of the adult Wallace and the first attack on the English stockade. Glen Coe. The landscape seen before the

burning of the English fortress. **Breaking The Waves** (1996)

Mallaig. Bess goes to the fishing boats in the harbour seeking salvation for Jan.

Morar. The location of the beautiful silver sand beach seen at the end of the film. Lochailort. The small white church just outside

the village is a key location throughout the film, beginning with Jan and Bess' wedding.

Joyeux Noel (2005)

Cille Choirill Church. Scenic backdrop.

Local Hero (1983)

Morar. The beach at the centre of negotiations in the film for purchase of a Scottish village by a Texas oil company.

Mrs Brown (1997)

Ardverikie Estate. Prime Minister Disraeli's journey to visit Queen Victoria at Balmoral takes him close to Ardverikie and Loch Laggan.

Seachd: The Inaccessible Pinnacle (2007)

Fort William. Scenic backdrop. Glen Coe. Scenic backdrop.

The Silver Darlings (1947)

Latheronwheel. The harbour scenes in this version of Neil M. Gunn's classic novel about 18th century herring fishers.

The Queen (2006)

Glen Feshie Estate. Used for Balmoral exterior shots in the film.

Trainspotting (1996)

Rannoch Moor. Location of the boys' day out and Renton's rant on the "virtues" of being

Winter Solstice (2003) Dunrobin Castle. A major location for this adaptation of Rosamunde Pilcher's novel.

Dornoch. The main location for this adaption of

Harry Potter Series (2001-2011)

Loch Morar. Scenic backdrop.

Loch Eilt. Scenic backdrop. Glen Finnan Viaduct. Famously a part of the route of the magical Hogwarts' Express.

Glen Nevis. Harry's first Quidditch Match takes place against the background of the glen in Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone.

Glen Coe, Highland

Loch Shiel. Scenic backdrop.

Glen Coe. A set consisting of several buildings, including Hagrid's Hut, was built for Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban.

Highlander (1986)

Torridon. Ramirez and Connor practise their swordplay in this dramatically stark area.

Eilean Donan Castle. The castle appears several times in the film as the ancestral home of Connor

MacLeod before he is cast out. Glen Nevis. Ramirez and Connor discuss the future Loch Shiel. Ramirez takes Connor out on the loch in a boat and then dumps him into the water to

freshen him up. Morar. Connor and Ramirez race together along the beach as Connor first experiences the quickening. Glen Coe. Site of the battle where Connor and the

Kurgen first meet, and Connor discovers that he is different to most men.

Loch Ness (1983)

Diabaig, Torridon. The village and shores of Loch Ness were relocated west for this movie shoot.

Eilean Donan Castle. Eilean Donan substitutes for Urquhart Castle in this family friendly monster

Loch Ness. The deep dark waters of Loch Ness appear as a scientist searches for its most well

Stardust (2007)

Loch Maree. Scenic backdrop.

Bealach na Ba. A port for Captain Shakespeare's flying ship on the cliffs overlooking the road.

Loch Coulin. Scenic backdrop. The Water Horse (2007)

Eilean Donan Castle. Seen during the film's opening titles.

Loch Ness. A brief appearance as the Water Horse is seen in the loch passing Urquhart Castle.

Loch Eilt. Seen during the film's opening titles.


Valhalla Rising (2009)

Gaelic Culture

Cultar Gàidhlig

The Highland landscape and scenery are well Highland culture, including the traditional language of Gaelic also makes an important language and would have been the native tongue for many people in the Highlands at the Rob Roy. Following periods of neglect, the language has survived into the modern century, aided by an increase in popularity from Gaelic media. Particularly significant were the 2007

release of Seachd: The inaccessible Pinnacle, the first contemporary Gaelic feature film and the more recent launch of a dedicated Gaelic television channel BBC Alba (Alba being the examples Gaelic is used on an everyday basis. On this map or when travelling around the Highlands you will frequently see the terms Na Gàidhealtachd (Highlands) or Eliean a' Cheò also used on road signs, in town and village


Skye. Locations like nowhere else on Earth.

From fantasy landscapes to ancient battlefields and prehistoric vistas, Skye has it covered.

Largest of the Inner Hebredian islands Skye, Eilean a' Cheò, is dominated by the dramatic Black and Red Cuillin and Trotternish mountain ranges which have provided the back drop to many commercials, television programmes, and of course films.

Skye has made many cinematic appearances; sometimes it makes a brief cameo such as the Old Man of Storr (3) at the start of **Prometheus**. On other occasions it is a major star as when it played the fantasy world of **Stardust**, or portraying itself in **Made of Honour** and Seachd: The Inaccessible Pinnacle.

Skye has also doubled for late medieval Japan in 47 Ronin and will be seen again in the latest film adaptation of Shakespeare's Scottish Play, Macbeth, starring Michael Fassbender and Marion Cotillard.

Snow White And The Huntsman (2012)

The Quiraing. The strange otherworldly look of this area adds to the fantastical feel of this film.

Old Man of Storr. A group of travellers are seen in an aerial of this unusual rock formation.



Science Fiction

Flash Gordon (1980)

Breakish. Flash Gordon and Dale Arden board a light aircraft here shortly before Ming the Merciless launches the attack on Earth.

Prometheus (2012)

The Quiraing. The film begins with dramatic aerial footage of this area of northern Skye.

Old Man of Storr. The fictitious cave containing the star map is located under this rock formation in the film.

The Land That Time Forgot (1975)

The Quiraing. The Quiraing is turned into sea cliffs at the end of this fantasy film as the hero casts his message in a bottle into the waves.

The Quiraing. The site of the film's gigantic (computer generated) stone Buddha.

The Quiraing. Featuring twice in the film this magical location fits perfectly with the film's overall tone.

The Fairy Glen. The evil Lamia encounters the caravan of Ditchwater Sal parked beside a small loch.

Loch Coruisk. Scenic backdrop.

Breaking The Waves (1996)

The Quiraing. A shot of this iconic area of Skye was used for a "chapter heading" in the film.

Neist point. Location of the graveyard seen at the film's climax.

Macbeth (2015)

The Quiraing. Scenic backdrop.

Seachd: The Inaccessible Pinnacle (2007)

Squrr Dearg. This well known peak is the focus of the events in this Gaelic language film.

Eilean Iarmain. Scenic backdrop.

Elgol. Scenic backdrop.
